

Nutrition & Physical Activity



Rhubarb Raspberry Crumble



Rhubarb is one of the first things to emerge in our gardens in BC but you can also find it fresh or frozen at the grocery store. This crumble is full of fiber because it's packed with whole grains and fruit, and much lower in sugar and fat than traditional recipes. Involve children by having them mix ingredients and layer them in the pan.

INSTRUCTIONS

- 1. Preheat oven to 350°F.
- 2. Grease baking dish.
- 3. Chop rhubarb in small pieces.
- 4. Combine with raspberries in the prepared baking dish and spread into an even layer.
- 5. Combine the remaining ingredients, working the butter in by hand so it is evenly crumbly, then layer on top of the fruit.
- 6. Bake for about 45 minutes.
- 7. Allow to cool a few minutes before serving.
- 8. Top with plain yogurt if desired.
- 9. Refrigerate any leftovers for up to 3 days.

Preparation Time: 15 minutes Cooking Time: 45 minutes Common Allergens: Milk, Wheat

Yield: 12 child size portions

EQUIPMENT

- Oven
- 9 x 9 Baking Dish
- Mixing Bowl
- **Cutting Board**
- Knife
- Measuring Cups

INGREDIENTS

- 3 cups rhubarb, fresh or frozen
- 3 cups raspberries, fresh or frozen
- 1 cup rolled oats
- 1 cup whole grain flour
- 1/4 cup hemp hearts (or other finely chopped nuts or seeds)
- 1 tsp cinnamon
- ¼ tsp salt
- 3 tbsp butter and/or olive oil

Age: 3-5

Change It Up / Alternatives

- Use shorter pool noodles that are easier to control.
- Try passing the ball between a small group of children.
- For children with impairments in flexibility or gross motor skills, encourage them to perform the movements as much as they can, understanding that it may look different to others.
- If you have a participant who uses a wheelchair, be intentional around the movements that you select to allow them to participate.
- If you have a child with another type of disability not mentioned above, they may be able to participate in this activity without adaptations or modifications.

How do pedagogical narrations invite us to (re)think curriculum in Early Childhood Education?

Part Two: Pedagogical Choices

This newsletter piece is an invitation to early childhood educators in the Cowichan Valley to engage in a conversation about pedagogical narrations and curriculum making in early childhood education. As a continuation of our previous writing piece, we are further engaging with the concepts of creating pedagogical narrations in early childhood classrooms. We invite you to revisit the ideas we introduced in our first <u>piece</u>, which wondered what the work of creating curriculum through pedagogical narrations might do to generate openings for questioning assumptions.

In this piece, we attend to the concept of pedagogical choices as a key aspect of pedagogical narration. As pedagogists, we concern ourselves with the specific choices made in early childhood classrooms, and wonder what is otherwise possible. The *BC Early Learning Framework* (2019) states:

Pedagogical choices include the plans, materials, and provocations that educators choose in their daily practice with children. Through the process of engaging with a pedagogical narration, educators can think about why particular choices are made and can experiment with ideas. (p. 59)

The invitation to think about choices pedagogically invites us to think intentionally about the choices we make. That is to say, not everything goes. We take seriously what Vintimilla and Pacini-Ketchabaw (2020) note as pedagogy's concern with the creation of a collective humanity. Pedagogy and pedagogical choice are therefore collective processes in response to the current conditions of the time and place in which we are situated.

As pedagogists, we work alongside educators, children and families to co-create pedagogical narrations. Through the collection and sharing of documentation traces (which can include but are not limited to notes, photos, videos, materials, audio recordings, or anything else that is considered a 'trace' of learning processes), we make pedagogical choices visible, and we are able to collectively wonder and experiment with these choices that focus on the ethics of living well together. Reflecting on pedagogical choices is therefore a key component of pedagogical narrations and offers a way to collectively think and dialogue.

In closing, we invite educators to attend to the pedagogical choices made for the purpose of creating more just/livable futures, and to consider the kinds of humans we want to be and the world we wish to live in.

To continue this dialogue, we invite you to join us for a series of virtual learning circles happening in the Cowichan Valley, taking place sequentially on **January 28**, **February 11**, **and February 25 starting at 6:30 PM**. These learning circles will focus on the co-creation of pedagogical narrations and curriculum making in early childhood contexts.

Professional Development certificates will be provided by the Early Childhood Pedagogy Network (ECPN) for registered participants.
